Ways to Focus on Grace and Gratitude

Presbyterians Today is a really outstanding publication, full of insightful and informative articles. (There are extras on the counter in the Welcome Center for anyone who might like to borrow one.) A recent magazine included suggestions for focusing on God's grace and growing in gratitude. Included were:

1. Write a letter to someone who's had a positive impact on your life (maybe a former teacher or mentor).
2. Commit to doing one thing each day to bless someone else. Then be grateful for the opportunity.
3. Shift your focus from what you want to how much you already have – then maybe give an extra gift to a church or charity of the amount you would have spent.
4. Thank the people whose good service makes your life easier – and take a few moments to let their supervisors know.
5. Express thanks for the bounty in your life by making someone else's life more bountiful – like collecting unused items in your home and giving them to charity.
6. Look for beautiful things that are often overlooked – and make a note of them. (Perhaps an early morning sunrise or a particular fall tree or the kind words overheard as you wait in line.) Jot at least one observation on your calendar each day.
7. Begin your prayers with thankfulness. Take time to let God know how grateful you are.
8. Tend God's creation in responsible, healthy ways.
9. Identify people in your congregation or community who need a break, like single parents or caregivers of older adults who could use household help. Offer to babysit or spend time to free up the caregiver.
10. Invite members to submit stories of how they have experienced God's grace in their lives and publish them. (Note the beautiful story of faith shared by Rod Anderson in this newsletter!)
11. Advocate and support those who work to lift up the poor and marginalized in the world. Motivated by gratitude, contribute to the betterment of life for others by volunteering in helping ministries and writing to elected officials and others in positions of power.
12. At the end of each day, identify something you are thankful for that was part of that day.

A Visit From Our International Peacemakers

Sunday evening, September 27, our congregation heard about the lives and work of *Rev. Berthe Nzemba from the Democratic Republic of Congo*. *Christi Boyd* our PCUSA mission co-worker in Congo, served as interpreter. (Rev. Nzemba speaks several African languages and French, which is also a national Congolese language.) We learned about faith amid the challenges of life in the impoverished nation which is also very rich in minerals and other resources. Rev. Nzemba has worked since the mid-1980's for the inclusion of women in the governing life of the church, and she has organized and directed ministries especially for women and children. The incursion of outside militia groups seeking to control the mineral resources in the east of the country has resulted in horrific violence against women. Rev. Nzemba, Christi, and church ministries supported by the PCUSA, are actively working to provide needed aid, counseling, and child care.

Traveling around the Presbytery and hosting them at our house, I (Lynn) was privileged to learn more of their stories. *Christi*, for example is a Dutch national who was born on the mission field and who married an American serving the church in Pakistan. *Rev. Nzemba* grew up in a devoutly Christian family. A custom in Congo is the *dowry*, (gifts from the bride's family to the groom's family at the time a wedding is arranged.) Rev. Nzemba knew at a young age that she wanted an education, something marriage would thwart. She spoke to her parents about it and reached an agreement that no marriage would be arranged for her – even if a suitor came calling – until she had received her diploma. Sure enough, a suitor came calling, and he was told by her father that he would have to wait until she finished her education – and he did!

Many thanks to the Outreach Committee, who sponsored the delicious reception after the Peacemakers' presentation. And thanks to all who came to learn about our church's wider mission and welcome visitors from Africa.

Sharing Ministry and Mission

The church is filled with inspiring stories of faith. Each of us has a story to tell of our individual faith journeys and how the Lord has blessed us along our way through caring people and the church community. We are blessed by *Rod Anderson* to share his faith story this month.

Debbie and I were married in 1987 and we loved each other very much. We rented until 1991 and that year we purchased our first home in Fairmount area in NE Canton. As I continued to work I’d do my best to be the best person I could be. Every time I had an opportunity to help someone I would. No matter if it were raking acorns from a client’s lawn, wheeling in a garbage can or cleaning snow from a drive or two I always would like lick my finger and strike in the air one for me. I had always thought that if there was a God, he would find favor in me because I was doing good deeds. The conversation would always get heated in our household on this subject because Debbie would always remind me that I would not find my way into heaven doing deeds and not accepting Christ as my savior. This all went back to my biology classes where I was taught that we evolved into the beings we are, not created. Years had gone by and every Sunday Debbie would get up and head off to Fairmount UPC and I’d stay at home thinking nothing of it and she’d return, proposing the questions again and my answer was I’ll be good on my deeds and she’d disagree and it continued, disagreement on religion.

A day in 2001 that forever changed my life forever, 9/11. I found myself asking many questions as did many other humans from all over the world. I went to church the following Sunday to seek some answers. I sat through the service where Cathy Arble ministered. We returned home and basically told Debbie that I got nothing from the Sunday service, nothing. The answer that was relayed to me was simple, it was said, “you know why, you don’t know Jesus.” The comment that my wife simply said changed my life. After a year of going to church and being taught what it meant to be Presbyterian and a believing Christian who accepts Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior I was baptized on December 16, 2002. This day itself will last forever in my life, forever. I was invited to Wooster that winter at the UPC conference and witnessed to the people in attendance and I can say the Holy Spirit was with me that day. I remember standing on the stage in a black suit, yellow shirt and my body moving and my hands and arms waving, that’s it.

Simply said, God had been knocking on my door and I ignored Him. I wore facial masks making people think I was a good man, but in reality I was a not at all. I swore like a drunken sailor, I drank and I treated my wife like crap. God transformed me into the man I am today. I believe in the everlasting Father, creator of all that is good.

Today I see things so different, my wife is number #1. I pray regularly, we pray together at every meal, our love for each other is great with God in charge. We have raised a child with God in her heart. I experienced the joy of death, preparing my Grandmother for her death with the holy sacrament, oil atonement, and her last rights knowing she is rejoicing in His Kingdom. I preached to my mother that she needed to change her ways and now attends Sebring PC on regular bases. I witnessed to every one of my clients when found Christ, pray with them and do what I am asked to do, evangelizing spreading the good news to each one of them. God is Good.

I look back and wonder how Debbie stayed married to such a bad man. But I realized that God was speaking to her and it was only time for me. I do believe that if I did not accept Christ as my Lord and Savior, she and I would not be married today. I feel very Blessed that God did knock on my door and I finally was tired of the pounding and opened it so His love would be poured out upon me. I have witnessed so many things that God has put before me, that if anyone wished to argue the fact that there is no God I’d say let’s have a cup of jo and we’ll talk. I thank my loving wife Debbie for believing in me as God did through me. I love you!

I thank you for receiving me into Reedurban PC, taking time to read this and hope it just causes some stirring and assurance within the heart that is reading this. No matter where, time, place and from whom, fellowshiping in the body of Christ with other believers is the best way to raise one’s curiosity and strengthen one’s believe in one God one Son and one Spirit.

PARISH HEALTH MINISTRY UPDATE

November is American Diabetes Month. This is very appropriate since Thanksgiving is the holiday most known for people to over eat amounts of carbohydrates, high fat and cholesterol foods, and concentrated sweets.

Diabetes is one of the leading causes of disability and death in the US. One in eleven Americans have diabetes, 29 million, **but 86 million** adults are at risk of developing type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease. They may have pre-diabetes, having no symptoms but lab values are higher than normal but not diabetic value.

A1C (test measuring average blood glucose for past 2-3 months)

Normal less than 5.7% Pre diabetes 5.7% - 6.4% Diabetes 6.5% or higher

FASTING PLASMA GLUCOSE (fasting except for water for 8 hours)

Normal less than 100mg/dl Pre-diabetes 100mg/dl to 125mg/dl Diabetes 126mg/dl or higher

ORAL GLUCOSE TOLERANCE TEST (2 hour test checking blood sugar before and after drinking special sweet drink)

Normal less than 140mg/dl Pre-diabetes 140mg/dl to 199mg/dl Diabetes 200mg/dl or higher

You can lower your risk of developing type 2 diabetes by 58% doing these 3 things

- Losing 7% of your body weight
- Eat a heart healthy diet limiting concentrated sweets
- Exercising 30 minutes per day 5 days a week

Check your blood pressure at our blood pressure screening at the Community Dinners, October 27, 2015 and November 17, 2015 from 4PM to 6:30 PM.


